Of the Board's 1,087 active appeals, the Army has 225 (20.7%), the Navy has 125 (11.5%), the Air Force has 75 (6.9%), the Corps of Engineers has 361 (33.2%), DLA and DCMA have 279 (25.7%), and the remaining 22 appeals (2.0%) are from other sources.

During FY 2015, there were 41 elections to have appeals processed under Board Rule 12 (28 expedited and 13 accelerated), 8 applications under the Equal Access to Justice Act, 13 motions for reconsideration, and no court remands. At the conclusion of FY 2015, there were 9 appeals being processed under Board Rule 12 (5 expedited and 4 accelerated), 5 applications under the Equal Access to Justice Act, 3 motions for reconsideration, and no court remands pending.

In FY 2015, the Board disposed of 121 appeals on the merits. Of those dispositions, 52.9% of the decisions found merit in whole or in part. The Board dismissed 526 appeals. In the majority of cases, a dismissal reflects that the parties have reached a settlement. The U.S. Court of Appeals for the Federal Circuit (CAFC) docketed 10 appeals from Board decisions, and 7 appeals, all docketed in FY 2014, were pending at the close of the fiscal year. During the fiscal year, the CAFC disposed of 12 appeals involving ASBCA decisions, 9 of which were affirmed, 2 were dismissed, and 1 was affirmed-in-part, reversed-in-part, vacated-in-part, and is expected to be remanded to the Board in FY 2016. The CAFC entered a final judgment dismissing a challenge by the dissatisfied party under the Wunderlich Act of two ASBCA decisions issued after proceedings were remanded to the Board during FY 2014.

During FY 2015, parties requested the Board's ADR services 37 times, covering 55 appeals and 4 undocketed disputes. Thirty-three requests were for nonbinding ADR and 4 requests, covering 4 matters, were for binding ADR. Fifteen of the requests received during the year were pending at the close of the fiscal year. Of the 33 requests concluded during the year, not limited to FY 2015 requests, 2 requests, covering 2 matters were for binding ADR, successful by nature. Two ADR requests, covering 4 matters, were unsuccessful, and 29 requests covering 51 matters, including 1 undocketed dispute, were successfully concluded.
